A direct descendant of Scarborough's founders, the Thomson family, Jean Kennedy Campbell is a stellar example of community leadership. For years, she shared her family's pioneering past with students at schools across Scarborough. A dedicated nurse and educator, Jean was a tireless advocate for the nursing profession and for her patients and the residents of Scarborough. She was elected to the Centennial College board of directors and became the first woman to chair a college board in Ontario. She helped establish Centennial's School of Health Sciences and officially opened Centennial College's Progress Campus in 1977.



blast, And our eternal home.

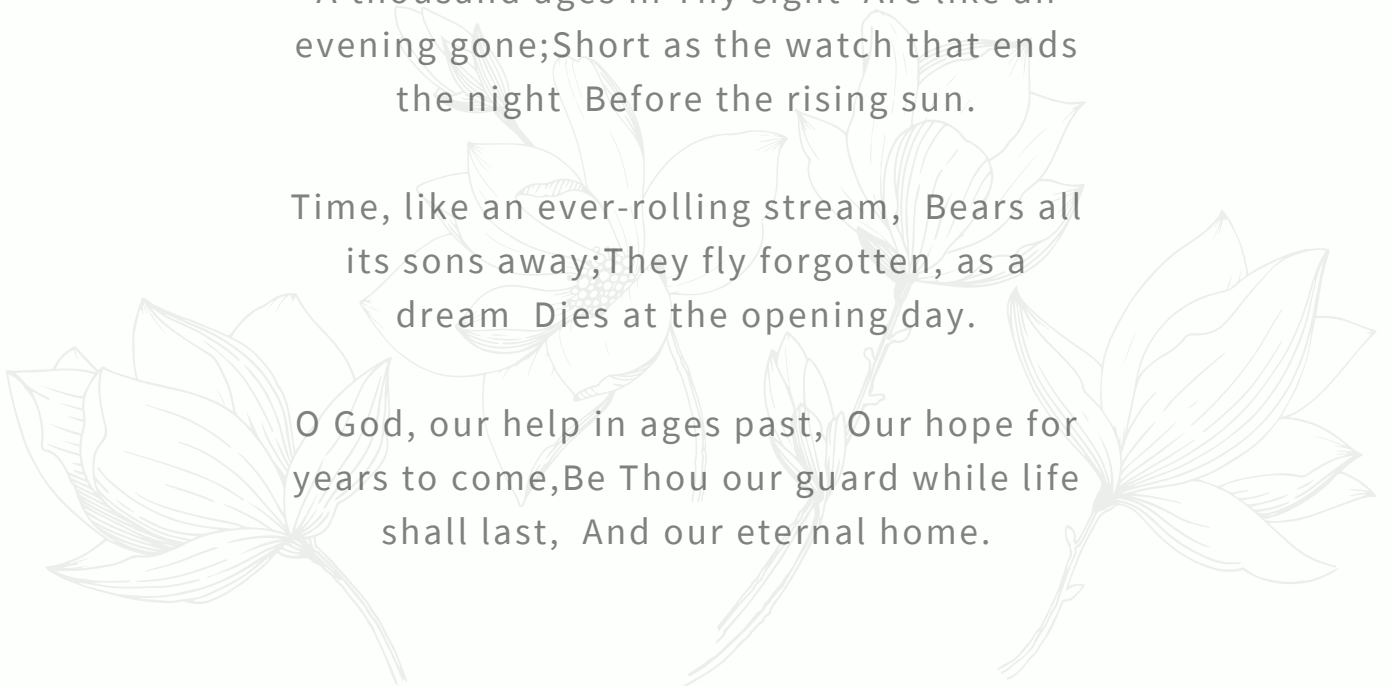
Under the shadow of Thy throne Thy saints

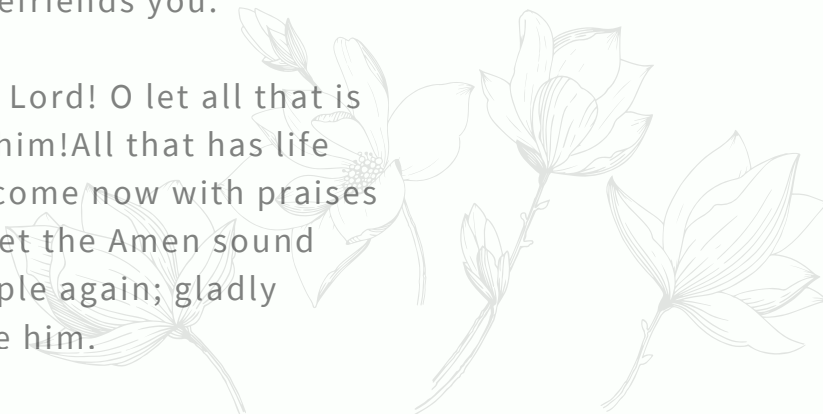

1st Corinthians 15

The Resurrection of Christ

1 Now, brothers and sisters, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, which you received and on which you have taken your stand. **2** By this gospel you are saved, if you hold firmly to the word I preached to you. Otherwise, you have believed in vain. **3** For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance[a]: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, **4** that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, **5** and that he appeared to Cephas,[b] and then to the Twelve. **6** After that, he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers and sisters at the same time, most of whom are still living, though some have fallen asleep. **7** Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, **8** and last of all he appeared to me also, as to one abnormally born. **9** For I am the least of the apostles and do not even deserve to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. **10** But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace to me was not without effect. No, I worked harder than all of them—yet not I, but the grace of God that was with me. **11** Whether, then, it is I or they, this is what we preach, and this is what you believed.

Jean Campbell — Chairman of the Board

At a recent tenth anniversary reception to thank Centennial College's Advisory Committees, Jean Campbell was introduced as the *Chairman of the Centennial College Board of Governors*. Although the speaker managed to conclude his remarks with the re-introduction of her as *Chairperson*, Jean began her speech by re-introducing herself as *Chairman*. That is typical of Jean Campbell. Not only would she not want anyone to feel ill at ease because of a faux pas, it really wouldn't be important to her how her title is interpreted anyway. It is doing the job that counts.

A most important part of doing that job is the opportunity for her to have continuous dialogue and contact with people.

"I really enjoy people. I like discussing issues with intelligent people and having the opportunity to accomplish some worthwhile goals. I enjoy watching young people grow and so I really enjoy my association with the College."

"Although, I am probably the worst person to have as Board Chairman."

The word enjoy crops up often in Jean Campbell's vocabulary. She seems to radiate enjoyment of everything in her present life: her volunteer work, her part-time jobs, her husband and her four teenage children, and now being Chairman of a Board as well.

"I have probably had the best of both worlds," she muses, "I am first of all a wife to my husband Ken, a mother to my three daughters and son who is the youngest at 12 years old; I have had a fulfilling career in public health nursing. I have always been active in community volunteer work, and I have been a member of Centennial's Board of Governors since 1973."

"I just listened in awe at that first Board meeting. I could hardly believe that community colleges were such a big reality, and now Centennial is

establishing its own uniqueness as a college." One of these unique qualities is the very open concept of operation which is delineated by *President Light*.

In one sense she did play the conventional wifely role for a time, during the period that her husband, who is an accountant, was involved in community organizations.

"For seven years I did all the job jobs with him during his efforts in service clubs and volunteer activities."

"Now if I didn't have my husband's support I wouldn't be able to do any of these things myself."

Naturally Jean Campbell has a particular interest in Centennial's Nursing Program. She graduated from Toronto East General School of Nursing and subsequently in public health from the University of Toronto. She worked for the Scarborough Board of Health for 17 years on and off in-between pregnancies. This included working at Agincourt Collegiate as public health nurse for five years, and working in Guelph General, St. Joseph's, and Scarborough General Hospital's, to name a few.

A highlight of her nursing career was being a member of the health team which carried out responsibilities during the first glaucoma survey ever done in Canada.

Her community volunteer work has included teaching home nursing for Scarborough Red Cross, organizing blood donor clinics and being educational coordinator and volunteer driver with the Agincourt Cancer Society.

Even while she is Centennial's Board Chairman she still works two days a week at Scarborough General Hospital and is extremely active in St. John's United Church, where during the past six years she has been an elder, a member of the board executive and president of the

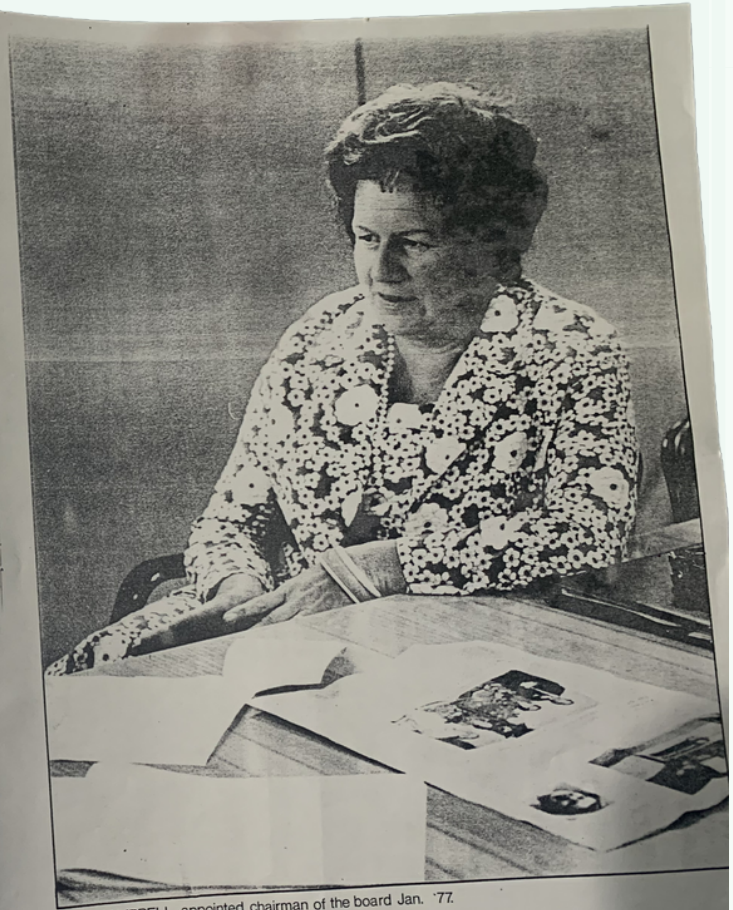
Women's Association. She also manages to support her children's school activities, entertain, and enjoys her hobbies: piano, tennis, gardening, sewing, boating, skating and walking. The day of her *Liaison* interview she had even found time to lunch downtown with her husband in-between meetings.

She doesn't feel frustrated as a member of the Board. She believes that all the board members were selected because of their sense of legal and moral responsibility for the sound management of the college.

She doesn't feel frustrated as a female either. She believes that opportunities depend on what a person wants to do. She was very interested in the important in-depth study on the status of women at Centennial College done by Marion Colby and her group, and feels that Centennial will make a real contribution in the area of affirmative action and equality of job opportunity.

Jean Campbell believes that Centennial should be proud of its contributions to its community. Certainly she should know a tremendous amount about a large part of this community, having lived on the same property in Scarborough on Kennedy Road (named after her ancestors) all her life. Six generations of her family have lived on that property and she is a fifth generation Kennedy and a sixth generation Thomson.

Jean Campbell is a real flesh and blood person. She is so real you could reach out and touch her, knowing there would be a warm response. In spite of her own assessment that she is probably the worst person to be made Chairman of the Board, her qualifications for the job are pretty damn good: a genuine interest and love for people, a genuine interest and love for the College.

As idle sounds, of few or none are sought -

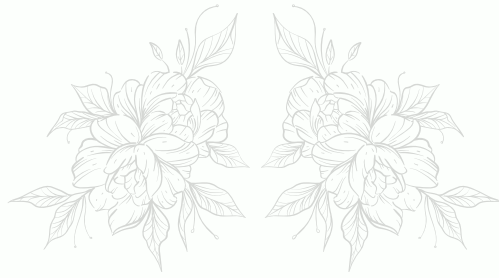

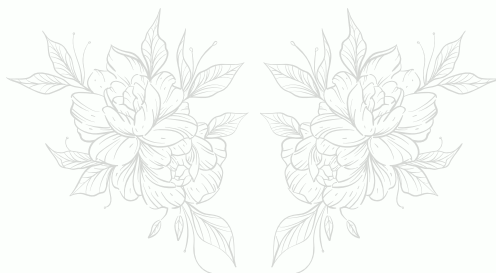
